Defining inclusive PSE

"Alternative pathway" programs

For students with IDD labels who **might not gain admission** to a 2- or 4-year college/university via traditional avenues

- Some offer **Dual enrollment/Concurrent enrollment** (for students 18-21 who are still in high school)
- A mix of inclusive and separate class settings
 - To be considered a "Comprehensive Transition Program" at least half classes and work experiences must be inclusive
- Possibility for on-campus housing
- Typically not degree-granting (but many offer a "certificate"), and students take courses on an audit basis
- Federal **financial aid** is possible
- Many include career development/internship component


An exciting moment for Inclusive PSE

- Legislative and policy precedence
 - Higher Education Opportunity Act 2008, ABLE Act 2014, Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act, 2014
- Almost 300 programs for students with IDD labels across the country and 8 in New Jersey (more later!)
- Growing body of research literature showing positive student outcomes
 - Better outcomes in employment, social engagement, community living (Butler, Sheppard-Jones, Whaley, Harrison, & Osness, 2016; Grigal, Hart, Smith, Domin, Sulewski, & Weir, 2016; Hartz, 2014; Moore & Schelling, 2015).
 - **Different sense of Self; expanded social networks; sense of disability pride and affinity (Vroman, 2019)

What makes a college experience "inclusive"?

Think College Standards, Quality Indicators, and Benchmarks

- 1. Academic Access
- 2. Career Development
- 3. Campus Membership
- 4. Self-Determination
- 5. Alignment with College Systems and Practices
- Coordination and Collaboration
- 7. Sustainability
- 8. Ongoing Evaluation

What are considerations for admission - Varies!

- Student has a documented intellectual disability
- Has the desire and motivation to participate in a college experience
- Can use technology (cell phone, tablet, laptop, etc.) at a basic level
- Age is between 18-25 years old upon admission
- Can self-administer medications
- Exhibits behaviors appropriate for a college setting
- Able to communicate with others and express needs
- Has parents who will support their independence
- Take all of this with a grain of salt! All students are different...
